## 11<sup>TH</sup> International Brothers Grimm Award

## "Global-Local-Glocal: Children's Literature and Everyday Life"

The 11th International Brothers Grimm Award ceremony (13:00-13:30) and the Commemorational Talk were held on November 18th, 2007 and approximately 70 people attended. The International Grimm Award is presented every other year to an individual who has contributed significantly to the international progress of research into children's literature. The 11th winner is Dr. John Stephens, who is a leading figure among research societies due to his social and cultural research, particularly in the area of gender theory in children's literature, of which he is something of a pioneer, having focused in depth on the concept of "masculinity".



## Dr. John Stephens



He was born in Ballarat, Victoria, Australia in 1944. He is a professor at the Department of English, Macquarie University and an honorary professor at the Beijing Normal University.

He has contributed toward the development of various societies for research and worked on a both national and international level: for example with the IRSCL as president from 1997 to 1999; as President of the *Australasian Children's Literature Association for Research* from 2006.
